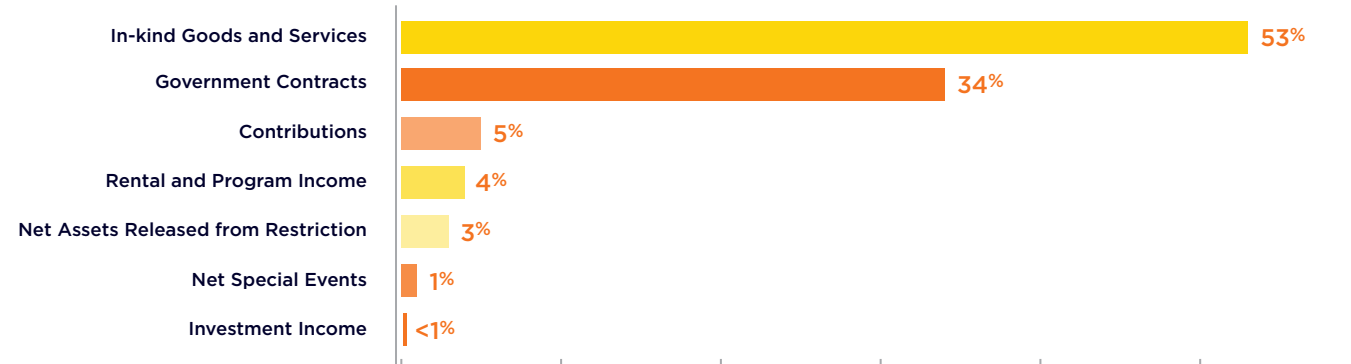

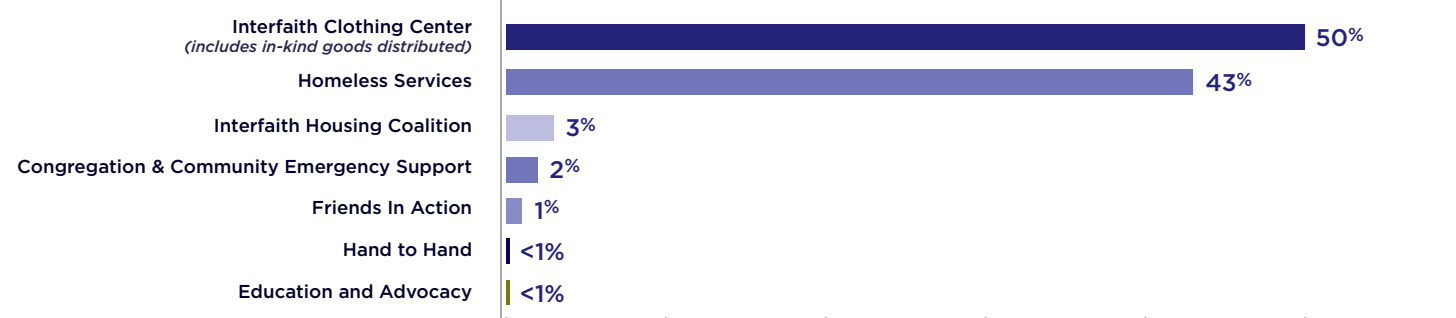

OUR STORIES



Frances's Story

Frances came to the United States in 1997. She married, moved to Alabama, started her own business, and had three beautiful children. All seemed right. But Frances' husband became controlling, physically abusive and lost all of their money investing in a bad business venture. To save her life and the lives of her children, Frances fled to Maryland to be near her sister.

After coming so far, she was starting all over.

Frances worked two jobs to support her family, but couldn't keep up with the rent. Eventually, she and her family were evicted from their apartment. In 2016, after living in a motel for a month, Frances and her children moved into an Interfaith Works (IW) housing unit. A devoted mother committed to bettering her children's lives, she immediately starting working with the IW Friends In Action family mentoring program, getting moral support and guidance from Interfaith Works' staff and a team of volunteer mentors.

Frances worked as a part-time nanny for various families, but she aspired for

a job with better pay and hours. Her IW case manager Katie referred her to the IW Vocational Services Program. She began working closely with IW vocational counselor Daisy to upgrade her resume to reflect her excellent work experience. Daisy told her about a 90-hour Early Childhood Education course offered at the Gaithersburg Library. Frances was eager to take the course and earn a certificate that would allow her to work with children in a professional setting.

With the support of IW's Vocational Tuition Assistance Program, Frances earned her Child Development Associate (CDA) credential, getting straight A's! Armed with her new credential, she worked closely with Daisy to apply for better jobs.

Frances was offered a full-time position as a lead teacher at daycare center in Potomac and now earns significantly more money to help support her three children. She has more time to spend with them and aspires to open her own child-care facility someday soon. "I so appreciate all that Interfaith Works did for me," Frances said.

Divya's Story

This letter is from an Interfaith Works' client who faced economic hardship following a divorce, including an extended period of homelessness when she lived in her car and on the streets of Montgomery County. Working diligently to address her issues with help from Interfaith Works, "Divya" now has secured a teaching position and hopes to buy her first home soon. Here are some highlights of her letter:

Dear Interfaith Works,

Starting from June 2013, I looked forward to visits from my Interfaith Works caseworker. The fact that someone was simply coming to make sure that I had a safe place to live, food to eat, did not feel lonely and abandoned, was a priceless gift that constantly inspired me to move forward and overcome all the hurdles, large and small.

They were detectives to ensure that no predators were around to abuse me or to take advantage of my vulnerability; and then they were advocates to observe and understand my needs and hunt for resources to help me.

They carried a magic concoction of words that disintegrated my frustration. They reminded, "You are a part of Interfaith Works, and Interfaith Works provides rental and protective support to help you with a peaceful place to live so you move forward and get back to your career."

Finally came Kaylisa and Alec. Their message: nothing is impossible – you have a will and we are here to help you find the way. They listened carefully, smiled and gently told me, "We knew you would have a plan for the next step. We were looking forward to help you execute it." Their confidence in me and their trust in my ability are my priceless assets that I am carrying as I venture alone in the world.

"You are and you always will be part of the Interfaith Works family. Don't you ever think you are alone." In quiet moments of struggle and apprehension, her words ring like sweet church bells bringing back hope and confidence.

The heart and soul that Interfaith Works case workers have poured in my wellbeing is entirely their own – it is their commitment to understand and help a distressed soul. They serve humanity and bring dignity to the most distressed and unfortunate segment of the society to integrate them back.

I shall always remain indebted to Interfaith Works and hope to come back as volunteer.

As soon as a cloud of apprehension comes on the horizon, a little voice inside tells me: "Don't worry, if you again become penniless and resourceless, then your Interfaith Works family will rush to look for you."
